MANAGER'S NOTEBOOK

Good afternoon and welcome back home after another really exciting week.

A special welcome to everyone associated with Corby Town. Between us we served up a really good game at Steel Park, although of course we felt aggrieved at the second sending off in particular, but we showed a lot of grit in that situation with 9 men. Credit to Corby, they sensed a chance to win and went for it. That brings us back to Creasey Park tonight and we hope to show good discipline as well as sticking to our plans.

We are on the back of a draw that many will feel we should have won and of course the Dunstable league derby win. We were delighted to win that and especially in the manor we did. Premiership goals that if you paid £30 to see, you would go home happy. We are producing really exciting football and memorable goals.

However, the draw against Colehill Town was also so important. We had 7 players out for various reasons and 4 changes to the starting line-up. This gave an excellent opportunity to players that have been waiting patiently. They stepped up and continued the playing ethos with great effect which demonstrates that we are building strength in depth and our link up with our development squad is paying off. We have truly turned this club into a pathway club, where our development squad can see the players that were next

to them and are now in the first team. Some into the second year and its clear for all to see how they have improved. This is the future of our club and the only viable sustainable solution. This requires total buy in from everyone associated with the club and huge patience to watch players come through learning cycles. We can't and won't simply go out and bring in players on big money. That cannot be a strategy for this football club currently. We are playing the long game.

Sadly another player with work and travel issues is Jetmir Ezzo. He simply cannot commit to us regularly enough and recognises the strength of the squad, meaning if he misses games others will step up. He's a great lad and will score goals. I hope he keeps playing back in Coventry and I am sure you all join me in wishing him the absolute best from the DTFC family.

CORBY TOWN HISTORY

Corby Town Football Club were formed in 1948 and are the second club to represent the town, following Stewarts & Lloyds Corby, who were formed 13 years earlier in 1935. The club's nickname 'The Steelmen' derives from the old steelworks that were in Corby.

The first chairman of the club was local MP William Montgomery, whilst Reg Smith was named the first manager. Smith had previously played for Millwall and Dundee whilst representing England at international level. Things started well for the newly formed Steelmen, winning their first game 5-1 against Wellingborough Town on 21 August 1948 at Occupation Road, which was home to Corby Town until the move to the Rockingham Triangle in 1985. It took the club only three years to win their first title, wrapping up the United Counties League in 1951 before doing the same again only a year later, with Ernie Middlemiss scoring a club record 135 goals in 136 games, a record that was to stand for 40 years. 1958 saw the introduction of floodlit football in Corby and in the same year the club moved from the Midland League to the Southern League.

The move to the Southern League looked to be a good one as the club narrowly missed out on promotion to the Premier Division in 1964, but promotion was gained the following year. The club made several unsuccessful applications to join the Football League, although they did receive one vote in 1966.

The club moved to the multi-purpose Rockingham Triangle venue in 1985 but it didn't prove to be a lucky move as the Steelmen were once again relegated from the Premier Division in 1990. They didn't spend long out

of the Premier as they achieved a league and cup double the following season.

The mid-90s saw a cash crisis at the club which threatened to put the club out of business, and although they were spared, relegation was to follow.

The turn of the millennium brought about more positivity at the Triangle as they consolidated their mid-table position in the Dr Martens league. More was to follow in 2005 as they just missed out on a play-off place under manager Rob Dunion. Dunion's side went one better in 2006 as they were promoted once more.

Corby Town saw a change of ownership in 2007 as a new board made up of ex-Kettering Town chairman Peter Mallinger, David Dunham and Mick Leech and in 2009, under Graham Drury, the Steelmen won the Southern League title. The Steelmen narrowly missed out on a play-off spot during their first season in the Conference North.

Club chairman Peter Mallinger sadly passed away in January 2011, just months before the club's new 3,000 capacity Steel Park stadium was due to open. His son David Mallinger took charge of the club and a positive start to life in their new home led the Steelmen into play-off contention and the first round proper of the FA Cup, where they were beaten by Bristol Rovers at the half-way stage.

Sadly off-field issues had an affect on results and Corby only managed to avoid relegation on the final day of the 2011/12 season, with Graham Drury leaving the club at the end of the campaign.



CORBY TOWN HISTORY

In the summer of 2012, a Leicestershire businessman took control of the club, with Ian Sampson being installed as manager. However after a tough start to the season Sampson departed and was replaced by his assistant manager Chris Plummer. The former Peterborough Northern Star manager could not repeat the survival act of the previous year however, with Corby Town being relegated from the Blue Square North at the end of the season.

Plummer remained in charge of the side, however resigned just two games into the 2013/14 season after heavy defeats against Burnham and Hemel Hempstead Town. The Chairman moved to appoint the managerial duo of Tommy Wright and Andrew Wilson, who helped to guide the club up the Southern League Premier Division table, however once again financial issues at the club prevented any real challenge to reach the play-offs.

In April 2014 it was announced that a local consortium of seven businessmen headed by Paul Glass had agreed a deal to purchase the club and save it from the threat of administration. Stevie Noble was appointed as the chairman and Tommy Wright was given sole charge of the first team, with Andrew Wilson departing.

In his first year in charge of the side Tommy Wright led his team to the Southern League Premier Division Championship. The Steelmen secured the title and promotion back to the Conference North with a dramatic 3-2 win on the final day of the season against Poole Town who had led the division by one point going into that fixture. Spencer Weir-Daley scored the winning goal for Corby with just nine

minutes remaining.

However Corby suffered relegation after just one season in the National North. After a period of uncertainty as to which league Corby would be placed in by the F.A., they made their first ever start in the Northern Premier League for season 2016/2017.

Tommy Wright was relieved of his position in early October 2016 after a poor start, and was replaced by Gary Mills ex Kings Lynn, and Wrexham Assistant manager in mid October 2016 as Corby looked to kick start season 2016/2017.

However Mills was relieved of his position after just 6 months, the job being placed in Steven Kinniburgh's hands for the rest of this season 2016/2017

In early May 2017 David Bell was appointed Manager along with Rob Gould as his Assistant as Corby hoped they could succeed in getting the club back into the 4th tier after 2 relegations in succession tumbling from the National North through the Northern Premier Leagues in successive seasons.

After a poor start to the 2017/2018 season the club parted company with them in late September 2017. Director of Football Steven Kinniburgh taking charge in a capacity of interim manager.

Steven was made permanent manager in Late March 2018. He appointed Ashley Robinson as his assistant in June 2018.

Connor joined in 2014. He has also played for Rushden & Diamonds, Kettering Town and also had a spell at Desborough Town

JAMIE ANTON

Jamie was born in Werrington and joined Leicester City becoming captain of the youth team. He first signed for Corby in May 2015 but left to play 1 season with St Neots. Returned to Corby in June 2016

ELLIOT SANDY

He has played for Rushden & Diamonds, Kettering Town, Brackley Town, Cogenhoe, Northampton and Stamford. Corby will hope his vast experience will help our younger players this season.

STEVEN KINNIBURGH

Born in Glasgow he played for Glasgow Rangers, Queen of the South, St Johnson before heading to England playing for Oxford Utd, Cambridge Utd, Bedford Town. He was also at local rivals Kettering Town for 3 ½ years before joining Corby in Mid-December 2016. Made permanent Manager in 2018 after a spell as interim Manager.

GREGORY LING

Greg was signed on the eve of the season by Corby from Newport Pagnell who play in the United Counties League 1 step below.

MILES SMITH

Rejoins Corby from St Ives, had a spell at Steel Park in 2017/2018. Hard Tackling full back. Other clubs include St Neots. Also was an apprentice at West Ham Utd.

SAM WARBURTON

Signed from from Kings Lynn. Can also play out wide on the left wing. Sam joined Corby in the summer of 2017.

JORDON CRAWFORD

A locally-born forward who initially joined Corby Town from Stewarts & Lloyds FC as a 17-year-old 2014. Jordan made nine first team appearances in 2014/15 and then spent the following season with Harborough Town. He returned to the Steelmen in the summer of 2016 and was a regular member of the starting XI throughout 2017/18. Voted young player of season in 2017/2018 by the NPL

GARY MULLIGAN

Born in Dublin and has played for Rushden & Diamonds, Sheff Utd, Gillingham. More recently at Northampton Town and lately Kettering Town. Gary was made club captain on his arrival. Gary joins us after 3 seasons with our local rivals.

DEAN McBRIDE

Dean was captain of Corby's u18 side, more than capable of stepping up when needed.

DINO TUKSAR

Dino joined Corby from Harborough Town after impressing our scouts with some good all round performances.

JAKE BETTLES

Signed from Desborough Town Looking to make the step up always full of running. Also has an eye for goal.

REPORTING IN DUNSTABLE TOWN 3-3 COLESHILL TOWN

With a squad ravaged by injuries, suspensions and players being unavailable, Blues Management duo, Tony McCool & Gareth Jackson, needed to re-shuffle their team and gave a first team debut to George Naismith, and first starts of the season to Charlie Black & Ben Collins in what was believed to be the first ever fixture between the two teams. In all there were seven changes from the team that took the field against AFC on Bank Holiday Monday.

Unbeaten in their last two games Town looked to turn optimism into more points and more goals, and got off to the perfect start when Saul Williams scored in the 3rd minute with a crisply hit shot which took his personal tally to three in his last two starts.

Parity was restored on 8 minutes when Joe Halsall got Coleshill's equaliser, only for Charlie Black, full of confidence after his goal on Thursday night for the Development Team, to get Dunstable's second.

Dunstable did well to repel persistent Coleshill pressure during the latter part of the first half but went into the break with their one goal lead still intact, thanks largely to a wonderful save from fit again Nathan Harness on the half hour and some impressive team defending, with Kieron Ogden being both vocal and effective.

Events took a turn for the worst for Dunstable when twice within the first five minutes of the second half, the Dunstable fortress was breached, firstly in the 47th minute by Reece Leek and then three minutes later when George Washburne converted from the penalty spot.

However just as they had done against, North Leigh, Berkhamsted and AFC Dunstable,

the boys in the brand new all blue strip came back and took the game to their opponents. This was the fourth game this season where Dunstable Town have come from being behind to draw level again. On Saturday it was captain, Arel Amu who dispatched a 66th minute penalty as coolly as you like to bring Dunstable level again. The penalty was awarded when Saul Williams was through on goal only to be wrestled to the ground by the Coleshill defender who was given a straight red by referee Andrew Hitchcox.

However credit to Coleshill who didn't park 10 men behind the bus but instead came hard at Dunstable seeking to prove the old saying that, "the best form is defence is attack" is correct.

However with one man short and gaps now appearing in midfield, Dunstable thought they'd made the extra man advantage count as Arel Amu ran on to a through ball who placed the ball agonisingly the width of a coat of paint wide, past the advancing Paul Hathaway's goal.

There were mixed feelings at the end of the game, Coleshill were disappointed having been ahead mid- way through the second half to be only leaving with a point, while Blues fans took pride in their team's battling performance with so many enforced changes.

That's three games unbeaten on the spin for Dunstable, and with a scoring record of three goals a game, Blues fans are certainly getting their money's worth in terms of entertainment.

BEDFORD FUTSAL ARE 'FOR ALL'

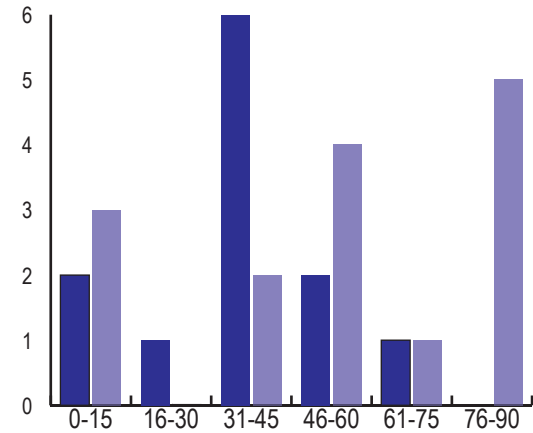
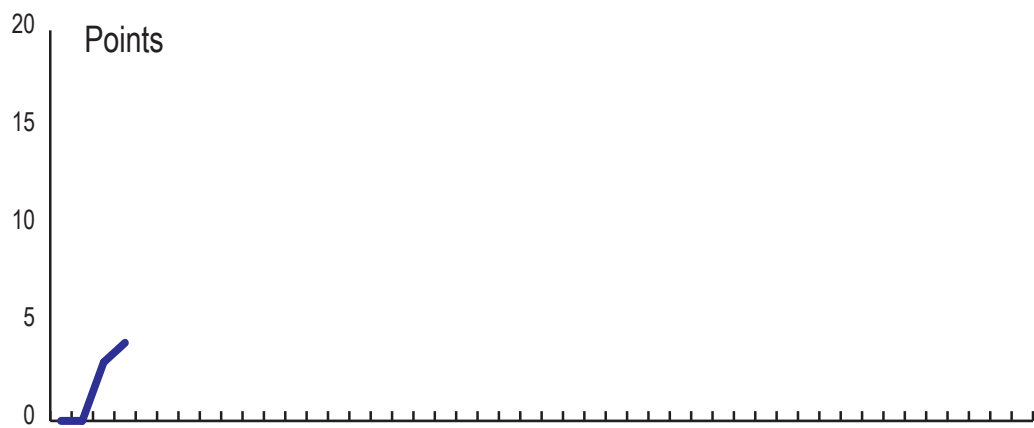
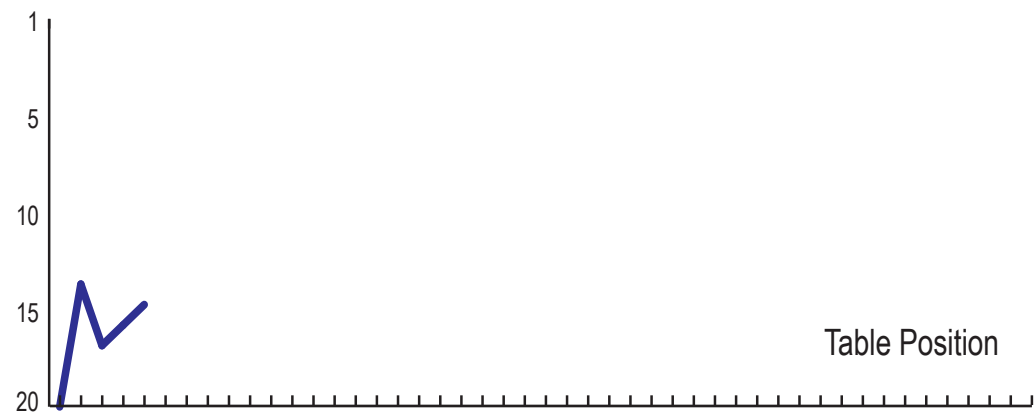

4 SEPTEMBER 1955 - THE EUROPEAN CUP KICKS OFF

On 4 September 1955, Sporting hosted the first European Cup match, drawing 3-3 with Partizan in Lisbon.

Gabriel Hanot, editor of the French magazine *L'Equipe*, spurred the creation of the tournament, originally named the European Champions' Club Cup. The magazine selected sixteen initial participants--each from a different country--chosen to represent a cross-section of the best European clubs (though some of their preferred teams, such as Chelsea, declined the invitation). They were then placed them directly into a two-legged knockout round.

Sporting were chosen from Portugal despite finishing the previous season in third place. Partizan had fared even worse, finishing fifth in the Yugoslavian league.

A crowd of 33,000 watched that first match,

played at Lisbon's Estádio Nacional, and were rewarded when Sporting midfielder João Martins (pictured) scored the opening goal in the 14th minute. Partizan winger Miloš Milutinović equalized in the 45th minute, then put the visitors ahead five minutes later. At the same time, the referee compounded Sporting's frustration, ejecting defender João Galaz from the match.

Despite being down to ten men, Sporting drew level with a 60th-minute goal from winger Joaquim Almeida, then fell behind again after a Partizan forward Stjepan Bobek in the 73rd before Martins salvaged a draw, scoring his second of the day in the 78th minute.

Partizan went on to win the second leg 5-2 on 12 October (with Milutinović scoring four) to advance to the quarterfinals, where they lost to eventual champions Real Madrid.

Last season, The FA piloted the use of sin bins for dissent at various levels across the English game. This year it will be expanded to even more leagues from Step 7 and below.

As part of an on-going series with the governing body, we caught up with Head of Judicial Services, Mark Ives.

What leagues will we see the use of sin bins in this coming season?

We piloted it last year in 31 leagues at different levels of the game – adult male, adult female, youth, Saturday Leagues and Sunday Leagues – so we had a broad understanding of how it fits into each of those categories.

It proved a massive success to the extent we are widening that group for this year. We will be including it in more than 60 other leagues, across the same level at Step 7 and below as well as a variety of County Cups. The view is then to make it mandatory at Step 7 and below across the country for 2019-20.

How long does a player spend in the sin bin?

It's important we make it as simple as possible so we don't have confusion game on game. For any fixture of 90 minutes duration, the period in the sin bin will be ten minutes. That's ten minutes of playing time, not ten minutes of flat time. So the referee will stop-start the clock depending on the various stoppages within the game. For games less than 90 minutes, it's eight minutes in the sin bin.

Why Dissent?

When you think about the seven cautionable offences, dissent is a behavioural issue. The other offences, some would argue, are part and parcel of the game and are footballing issues. Dissent has an impact on people's enjoyment – and by that I don't just mean referees, other people don't like it either. The amount of cautions for dissent at grass-roots level the season before accounted for 73,500 yellow cards. So 25 per cent – one in four – were for dissent. We want to change that behaviour.

How will the official communicate it? What have referees been told about it?

It's a yellow card offence so a yellow card is shown. Some people believe a different colour card will assist but that's not in our right to introduce that. But as it stands at the moment, the referee will issue a yellow card and point to the side of the pitch. We found during the pilot that, while some are of the opinion a different colour card will assist for the communication for spectators, at grass-roots level people will see the player walking off, will know we are using sin bins and understand what happens.

Are players still fined?

Sin bins are intended to have an immediate impact and the player serves their sanction there and then. If a player learns from that we will not attach to their yellow card the £10 administration fee.

We're supporting



The Forum - Busy Getting Stronger is one of our partner organisations, based in Flitwick, and we work hard to support them when we can. We recently attended an event they organised at Redborne Upper School in Ampthill to help them highlight the importance of young people's mental health and wellbeing.

The feedback from young people attending the event was very positive, with lots of requests for similar events in the future to explore other aspects of mental health. There were many organisations represented with stands as well as Mind BLMK, including CHUMS, Papyrus, and Healthwatch.

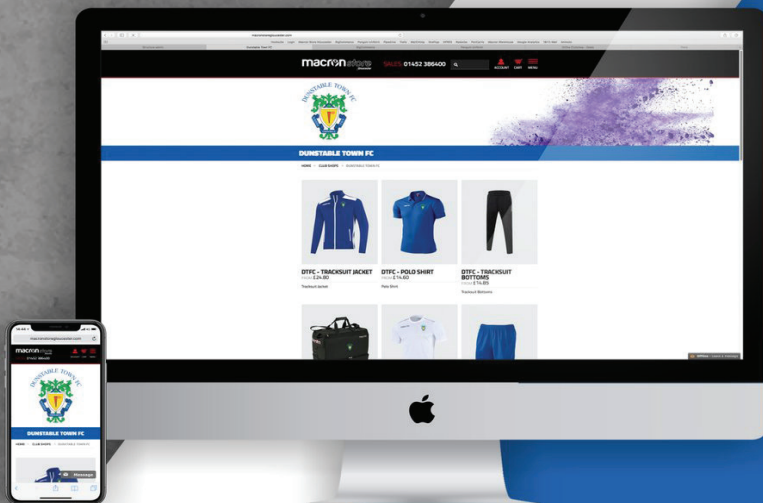
One of our supporters, Hannah Brown who has set up An Ear to Hear, a peer support

ON THE ROAD WITH THE BLUES

The club was established in 1917 by a merger of Chesham Town and Chesham Generals. The new club joined the Spartan League in 1919, which the Generals had been members of prior to World War I. League reorganisation in 1928 saw them placed in Division One West. However, the following season saw them placed in the Premier Division after further reorganisation, and they were league runners-up in 1929–30, before going on to win the league in 1932–33.

The 1990–91 season saw Chesham win Division One, earning promotion to the Premier Division. They went on to win the Premier Division in 1992–93, but were denied promotion to the Football Conference due to their ground failing to meet the necessary criteria. The club were subsequently relegated back to Division One at the end of the 1994–95 season, although they did reach the FA Cup first round, losing 1–0 to Bashley. However, they returned to the Premier Division after winning Division One in 1996–97. Following relegation to Division One North at the end of the 2002–03 season, the club finished fourth in 2003–04, earning promotion back to the same level.

Chesham finished bottom of the Southern League Premier Division in 2005–06, resulting in relegation to Division One South & West.

After one season in the division they were transferred to Division One Midlands. A fifth-place finish in 2008–09 saw them qualify for the promotion play-offs, in which they lost 2–1 to Nuneaton Town in the semi-finals. They reached the play-offs again the following season with a fourth-place finish, and after beating Burnham 1–0 in the semi-finals, they defeated Slough Town 4–0 in the final to earn promotion back to the Premier Division. The club went on to qualify for the Premier Division promotion play-offs in 2011–12, losing 3–2 to AFC Totton in the semi-finals. The following season resulted in another play-off qualification, this time losing 2–0 to Hemel Hempstead Town in the semi-finals. A third successive play-off campaign was secured when they finished as Premier Division runners-up in 2013–14, but after beating Stourbridge 2–1 in the semi-finals, they lost 3–1 to St Albans City in the final.



ON THE ROAD WITH THE BLUES



The club was established in 1909. They initially played in village leagues and won the Lord Jersey Cup in 1929, beating Fritwell 2-1 in the final. In 1945 the club joined the Oxford City Junior League, before progressing to the Oxfordshire Senior League in 1951. They were champions of the league in 1952-53 and moved up to the Hellenic League in 1954. When the league gained a second division in 1956, the club were placed in the Premier Division.

In 1961-62 Kidlington finishing second-from-bottom of the Premier Division and were relegated to Division One. They were Division One runners-up in 1963-64, earning promotion back to the Premier Division

However, they were relegated again two seasons later. League reorganisation saw them placed in Division One B in 1971-72, before it reverted to a single division the following season. The club won the Division One Cup in 1974-75, and after finishing as Division One runners-up in 1978-79, they were promoted back to the Premier Division.

However, the club finished bottom of the Premier Division in 1981-82, resulting in relegation to Division One.

In 2000 Division One was split into regional sections, with Kidlington placed in Division One West. A third-place finish in 2004-05 saw them promoted to the Premier Division. They won the league's Floodlit Cup in 2007-08 and the Supplementary Cup in 2010-11.

After finishing the 2015-16 season as Premier Division champions, the club were promoted to Division One Central of the Southern League and finished a creditable 12th. At the end of the following season they were transferred to Division One West.

The club were transferred again to Division One Central of the Southern League at the end of the 2017-18 season as part of the restructuring of the non-League pyramid.
