

What that game did show us though is what a terrific force we can be going forward and the exciting football we can produce. It also demonstrated what defensive resilience we have built up in adversity and thankfully, we held on to bring the game back to Creasey Park. I do not feel that we are in a position to appeal those decisions, due to the lack of video evidence forthcoming.

It filled me with great pleasure to have been part of an historic Dunstable Derby. It took some concentration to ensure I sat in the correct dugout and each visit to the dressing room made me pause to consider my actions. #### **COLESHILL TOWN HISTORY**

Coleshill Town was founded in 1894 making them one of the oldest clubs in non-league football and the oldest in Warwickshire.

Until 1964 Coleshill played mostly in junior leagues, but then local rivals Coleshill Hall Hospital F.C. folded and the cream of their players joined Town. As the standard improved, Coleshill joined the Mercian League and then the Combination in 1968 winning Division Two in 1969/70, and the Combination Cup in 1970.

Playing at the Memorial Park, the club needed its own ground to get promotion and in 1974 they moved to their present site Pack Meadow, mainly due to the determination and dedication of Percy Hastings.

Promotion to the top flight of the Combination soon followed in 1975 and there they stayed, apart from one season in Div 1, for more than thirty years. Coleshill's greatest achievements during that time saw them as M.F.C. Premiership runners up in 1983/84 and winning the Walsall Senior Cup in 1983. Other highlights included a run in the Birmingham Senior Cup in 1988/89 beating Birmingham City then holding Wolverhampton Wanderers to a draw. The replay at Molineux was against the Wolves first team including the outstanding young strikers Steve Bull and Andy Mutch.

The Colemen more than matched their Black Country opponents for over an hour. Although Town tired and conceded late goals they prevented Steve Bull from scoring, something that the Scottish International team failed to achieve at Hampden Park a few weeks later.

Old Boys include Danny Hagen, the former Irish International who played in the U.E.F.A. Cup Final for Wolves in 1972, but our greatest

son is without doubt Gary Shaw who was picked up by Villa whilst playing for Coleshill as a sixteen year old.



In more recent times the club enjoyed the 1997/98 season under Martin Socket who led the side to the top of the Premiership before leaving to join Dr Martin's VS Rugby.

A succession of managers have come and gone, usually taking all the players with them. Mick Beadle steadily improved the side in the four years he was with the club, but former Kettering player and Bedworth Ass Manager, Carl Adams was appointed manager in September 2008 and he led Coleshill to the Midland Combination Premiership Championship for the first time in the club's history, clawing back a 22 point deficit and beating Highgate United to the title on goal difference, on the last day of the season.

Fifteen games into the new season Carl Adams stood down quoting family and work commitments the reason for his departure. Neil Kitching and Martin Socket were quickly installed as a joint management with the Reserve team that season winning the Challenge Bowl.

In October 2005 Coleshill were awarded Adult Standard Charter status by the football Association and in 2012 awarded Junior Standard Chartered Status and maintain those standards today.

In 2011-12, Coleshill Town reserves won the MFC Reserve Division Two tile and were runners up in the Challenge Bowl cup final,

in 2013-14 finished runner ups in the MFL Reserve Division One and in 2015-16 were crowned champions of the Reserve League and were runners in in their League Cup.

In 2012-13 the club had three managers with Paul Casey being appointed mid way through the season with the thankless task of saving the club from relegation with two games to go this task was achieved. The U18's finished a credible third in the floodlight league and were finalists in the Birmingham Youth Cup.

2013-14 was a record breaking season, finishing 4th the Midland Football alliance the highest ever position in the clubs history breaking all previous win, goal scored etc stats and he took the team to the fourth round of the FA Vase narrowly missing out on victory in the North east at Dunston.

2014-2015 was yet again a record breaking season, finishing 2nd the newly formed Midland Football League breaking the 2013-14 season records for the highest ever position in the clubs history breaking all previous win, goal scored etc. stats and he took the team to the semi-final of the Birmingham Senior cup missing out on a place in the final taking Birmingham City all the way to penalties.

2015-16 proved a little more difficult, with a new state of the art 3G pitch not completed until October, the first two months of the season the Coleman spent their time playing all game's away from home. However the team finished in 5th reaching the fourth round of the FA Vase and the third qualifying round in the FA Cup. 2016-17 development of players from feeder teams worked well with the first half of the season under Paul Casey consolidated

performances in the league, Paul left before the Christmas period with assistant Manager



Simon Lyons taking over the manager's role. Under Simon he further consolidated performances narrowly missing out on promotion finishing in second place and reaching the semifinal of the FA Vase losing the aggregate tie over two legs to the eventual winners South Shields. The first home leg tie saw a record crowd of 3,465 at the Pack Meadow

In 2017-18 ex Aston Villa player Cameron Stuart took over the reins along with his challenge to bring promotion to club, this he achieved along with an appearance at Walsall FC in the Midland Football League, League Cup final, means we are here to today playing in the Southern League, this being the highest league the club have ever played in.

So, here we are this season in the Southern League and in a newly formed division, expectations of Cameron are always held high at the club, however I am sure those that are new to this league will want to avoid relegation, learn from this season and use all this to ensure Southern League Status is not lost in the coming seasons.

In total at senior level and junior team status, we have a number of teams all supported by a professional and dedicated board of directors and volunteers who believe in developing and offering the ability for all to play the wonderful game at Coleshill Town Football Club.

### REPORTING IN AFC DUNSTABLE 2-3 DUNSTABLE TOWN

A healthy bank holiday crowd of 302 gave Creasey Park a good atmosphere which seemed to enthuse both club's mascots who noisily cheered their favourite sides on.

First blood went to AFC who went ahead through Tony Burnett in the 9th minute. Back came Dunstable Town with energy and spirit causing the AFC backline worries as several shots were blocked before parity was eventually restored in the 24th minute by Saul Williams, played in by a delightful ball by the impressive Hassan Sheikh, to finish strongly past Jamie Head.

Arel Amu was stopped at the last minute by a well-timed tackle from Joe Steele but a few minutes later Dunstable went ahead with Chris Wreh finishing past the advancing Jamie Head. Minutes earlier, Head had saved Arel's penalty, but a goal a minute before half time is always considered to be an important time to score.

Dunstable Town extended their lead in the 55th minute with a second goal for Saul Williams, who has waited patiently to be given his chance and who, today, grasped it with both hands.

The last time Dunstable Town were 3-1 up, was exactly 42 hours earlier at Steel Park, Corby, who had got a foot back in the game in the 55th minute, and went on to secure an improbable draw at the end of the 90 minutes. Thankfully today history did not repeat itself. Dunstable Town managed to keep most of the AFC playmakers quiet and restricted shots on goal from mainly distance, although in the 78th


minute, AFC, were unlucky not to get a second, with a shot which bounced off the post and was cleared.

Tony McCool looked to shore up the back line with the introduction of Erin Amu, Daniel Trif and George Naismith, replacing James Lauder, Chris Wreh and Hassan Sheikh during a 20 minute period in the second half, and every one of the men in white shirts today did their jobs, followed instructions and stuck to the game plan.

A second goal for AFC from Charlie Clayton as we approached stoppage time caused anxious and repeated glances at watches but after 6 minutes of added time, Referee, Ashley List blew his whistle to the delight of the DTFC management, players and supporters.

Since the change in Club stewardship last summer we have dreamt of developing a football pathway for young players to rise through the different age groups and aspire to play in First team via the Development Team.

With both Simon Reilly and Colin Lauder present today, in addition to the six youth team managers, the unity we have hoped we could bring about appears to be slowly but surely taking place, although we know there is no room for complacency or taking each other for granted, the future does look like one we can shape and influence in the long term best interests of the club to enable it to be sustainable for the next generation of prospective Chairmen, Treasurers and Secretaries

#### 1 SEPTEMBER 1992 - LIKE I NEEDED ANOTHER DISTRACTION IN MY LIFE

On 1 September 1992, the first Championship Manager video game hit store shelves. The series has since become one of the most successful in UK history.

The game, written by brothers Paul and Oliver Collyer, was first released on the Amiga and Atari platforms, but soon moved to PCs. Pitched as "the most realistic football management simulation ever," it allowed players to manage teams from the top four divisions in English football through the league and cup competitions (including European tournaments).

It initially drew criticism for the lack of graphics, which resulted from the game's focus on managerial decisions instead of match play, but later versions allowed the user to watch the matches unfold. One version, Championship


Manager 4, became the fastest-selling PC game of all time in the UK.

The Collyer brothers formed their own company, Sports Interactive, to develop the game. In 2004, a split with publisher Eidos Interactive resulted in the Collyers and SI losing the rights to the Championship Manager name. They formed a partnership with Sony and began a separate franchise under the name Football Manager. The two games now compete against each other.

In the summer of 2012, in honor of the game's twentieth anniversary, BackPage Press published a book titled *Football Manager Stole My Life*.

Or at least they didn't until a couple of Saturdays ago when Chester astonishingly returned home from Blyth Spartans on the wrong end of that very same scoreline, a horrendous example of life imitating art.

Apart from ruining my night – and our goal difference – the crushing defeat also rapidly rendered redundant my previous column, in which I expressed mild optimism at the joint

managerial appointment of Bernard Morley and Anthony Johnson.

Talk prior to Blyth was of a team bonding exercise on the long coach trip to the North East. Details have not been released of exactly what that entailed, although if it didn't involve 144 cans of strong European lager and four dozen meat feasts then it may as well have.

Eleven fans dragged out of the pub could scarcely have put on a more desultory display. But as the editor of this paper, Alex Narey, was quick to point out, freak results can happen at this stage of the season and are not necessarily indicative of a long-term demise. The games come thick and fast, and at least we had a chance to make amends at home to Kidderminster on the Tuesday.



#### ON THE ROAD WITH THE BLUES

The club was established in 1917 by a merger of Chesham Town and Chesham Generals. The new club joined the Spartan League in 1919, which the Generals had been members of prior to World War I. League reorganisation in 1928 saw them placed in Division One West. However, the following season saw them placed in the Premier Division after further reorganisation, and they were league runners-up in 1929–30, before going on to win the league in 1932–33.

The 1990–91 season saw Chesham win Division One, earning promotion to the Premier Division. They went on to win the Premier Division in 1992–93, but were denied promotion to the Football Conference due to their ground failing to meet the necessary criteria. The club were subsequently relegated back to Division One at the end of the 1994–95 season, although they did reach the FA Cup first round, losing 1–0 to Bashley. However, they returned to the Premier Division after winning Division One in 1996–97. Following relegation to Division One North at the end of the 2002–03 season, the club finished fourth in 2003–04, earning promotion back to the same level.

Chesham finished bottom of the Southern League Premier Division in 2005–06, resulting in relegation to Division One South & West.

After one season in the division they were transferred to Division One Midlands. A fifth-place finish in 2008-09 saw them qualify for the promotion play-offs, in which they lost 2-1 to Nuneaton Town in the semi-finals. They reached the play-offs again the following season with a fourth-place finish, and after beating Burnham 1-0 in the semi-finals, they defeated Slough Town 4-0 in the final to earn promotion back to the Premier Division. The club went on to qualify for the Premier Division promotion play-offs in 2011-12, losing 3-2 to AFC Totton in the semi-finals. The following season resulted in another play-off qualification, this time losing 2-0 to Hemel Hempstead Town in the semi-finals. A third successive play-off campaign was secured when they finished as Premier Division runners-up in 2013-14, but after beating Stourbridge 2-1 in the semi-finals, they lost 3-1 to St Albans City in the final.





The club was established in 1909. They initially played in village leagues and won the Lord Jersey Cup in 1929, beating Fritwell 2–1 in the final. In 1945 the club joined the Oxford City Junior League, before progressing to the Oxfordshire Senior League in 1951. They were champions of the league in 1952–53 and moved up to the Hellenic League in 1954. When the league gained a second division in 1956, the club were placed in the Premier Division.

In 1961–62 Kidlington finishing second-frombottom of the Premier Division and were relegated to Division One. They were Division One runnersup in 1963–64, earning promotion back to the Premier Division

However, they were relegated again two seasons later. League reorganisation saw them placed in Division One B in 1971–72, before it reverted to a single division the following season. The club won the Division One Cup in 1974–75, and after finishing as Division One runners-up in 1978–79, they were promoted back to the Premier Division.

However, the club finished bottom of the Premier Division in 1981–82, resulting in relegation to Division One.

In 2000 Division One was split into regional sections, with Kidlington placed in Division One West. A third-place finish in 2004–05 saw them promoted to the Premier Division. They won the league's Floodlit Cup in 2007–08 and the Supplmentary Cup in 2010–11.

After finishing the 2015–16 season as Premier Division champions, the club were promoted to Division One Central of the Southern League and finished a creditable 12th. At the end of the following season they were transferred to Division One West.

The club were transferred again to Division One Central of the Southern League at the end of the 2017–18 season as part of the restructuring of the non-League pyramid.
